LEX 130 Civil Injuries

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Prerequisites: ENG 090 or DRE 098 or satisfactory score on placement test

Corequisites: None

This course covers traditional tort concepts and the evolving body of individual rights created by statute. Topics include intentional and non-intentional torts with emphasis on negligence, strict liability, civil rights, workplace and environmental liability, remedies, and damages. Upon completion, students should be able to recognize, explain, and evaluate elements of civil injuries and related defenses. Course Hours Per Week: Class, 3. Semester Hours Credit, 3.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

Upon completing requirements for this course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Recognize, explain, and evaluate the elements of civil injuries and related defenses
- 2. Identify and explain the elements of intentional torts, such as assault, battery, false imprisonment, intentional infliction of mental distress
- 3. Explain the elements of nonintentional torts and negligence, including duty, breach of duty, causation and damages
- 4. Describe the theory of strict liability
