LEX 180 Case Analysis and Reasoning

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course covers the techniques of reading and applying legal opinions and the skills of case analysis. Emphasis is on the components of opinions and on types of legal writing. Upon completion, students should be able to read, analyze, and brief opinions as well as prepare legal memoranda, briefs, and other legal documents. Course Hours Per Week: Class, 1. Lab, 2.
